FROM OUR PRESIDENT

As my term as President of AAUW Valley Forge comes to a close, I can't help but reflect on my years with AAUW. I joined the North-Hills McKnight Branch in Pittsburgh in 1972. We had recently moved to Pittsburgh where I knew no one and I was a young mother with a two-year-old. During my two years there I remember studying World Hunger. I also bought a house, received my MA in Library Science, and had my son.

In Sept of 1974 we moved to Houston, Texas. Since we settled in the western suburbs, I felt Houston was too far to attend meetings, so I helped start up the West Harris County Branch, which is still going strong. An ongoing project was the organization and celebration of a monthly birthday at a local group facility for adjudicated teen girls. Once a month we would arrive with a birthday cake, small gifts and games. We really just talked to the girls. Some had never had a birthday party. Some had never talked to a white person not in the justice system. I believe we all benefitted from the connection.

In 1978 we moved to Pottstown, PA, where I immediately joined the Pottstown Branch. Over the next 8 years I held many positions including President. Our big fundraiser was a quilt (handmade by members) and an art auction. I left the branch and joined the Perkiomen Branch, which met at Ursinus College. At that time the area was all farmland (not houses as it is now) and the branch folded.

In 1988 I moved to Phoenixville, remarried, and in 2001 joined Valley Forge Branch. Maryrose Petrizzo and Lunetta Headley were co-presidents and made me feel very welcome. I have attended National meetings in San Francisco, Phoenix, St Louis and Washington, DC., and was on State Board for four years. I have attended too many PA State meetings to list. I have thoroughly enjoyed the many branch programs, the hard work running the book sales, Afternoon Lit, Current Events, and all the wonderful people I've met and friends I've made.

I'm not going anywhere. I'm still Webmaster and Bylaws Chair and will be starting a new program in September to fund teachers' projects in our local school districts. More about this in August.

In recent days and weeks, we have seen many unsettling issues coming up with regard to human rights and to programs that help those in need. As I have mentioned at recent meetings, LQBTQ persons are facing backlash and discrimination, DEI programs are being challenged, women's health programs and funding may be reduced, and money sent to food programs is being drastically reduced.

The last item mentioned (funds to food programs) is something I have been involved with recently. As a Junior League board member, we are facing challenges with our community programs. One of our partners in Philadelphia was just notified that their funding is being cut/ended (in the millions of dollars) and a local food pantry that we help, with regard to serving and packing, has also faced a cut in funding. So, I think that, as we live in different communities, we should pay attention to our local food banks to see what they may need. Basically, the cutting or elimination of government funds is vast and so harmful to many groups. Perhaps, next year, we can look at ways to help community partners with our public policy programs.
